# Theta Xi Alumni Meet for 25th Fraternity Anniversary

Theta Xi has a long history with Fairmont State, originally organized on campus as Omicron Pi Chapter of Kappa Sigma Kappa in 1928. In 1962 it became the Kappa Gamma Chapter of Theta Xi. In the late 1970s the Chapter was not able to survive a slump in common interest and economic requirements to sustain chapter membership status; however, sometime during the mid 1980s several of the Theta Xi alumni brothers began having informal get-togethers and as the numbers grew it was decided to meet annually. The founding members constructed a charter and formally organized the Kappa Gamma Alumni Association (KGAA) in 1992. Officers were elected and the annual two-day reunions were planned and held at various locations over the years: several in Fairmont, others in Virginia Beach, Ohio and Cheat Lake (WV) but mostly in Canaan Valley (WV),

which has become the currently desired central location.

As the KGAA continued to grow it applied for and was granted a Certificate of Registration with the U.S. Copyright Office in August of 2001.

Alumni Spotlight

Dr. Maria C. Rose



The creation of the Maria C. Rose Endowed Scholarship for first-generation college students was a special tribute to Rose's many years of service to Fairmont State University. After being part of the Fairmont State family for more than 25 years, Dr. Maria Rose became the University's president on May 3, 2012. Prior to her appointment, she served as Interim President, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs and as a faculty member. Rose retired on June 30, 2017.

Focusing the scholarship award was a personal touch to salute Rose, who was the first in her family to attend college like many of FSU's students. Rose often speaks fondly of her parents and their support of her pursuit of higher education.

"Growing up, I always knew I wanted to be a teacher. I was one of those kids who played school. There was never a doubt in my mind or in my parents' minds that I would go to college, but never in my wildest dreams did I think I would someday be a university president. That is the power of a higher education degree. Education can create opportunities you never dared to imagine," Rose said.

A testimonial to the bond between KGAA members and Fairmont State is that three of the brothers have established endowed scholarships with the Fairmont State Foundation School of Education, Health & Human Performance. Others have served on the FSU Alumni Board and other university boards and committees assisting in fundraising.

The 2017 25th 'official' reunion in Canaan Valley had 45 attendees with Kappa Gamma numbers ranging from KG-43 to KG-379. In addition to the annual reunion, many Kappa Gamma Alumni Association members keep in touch by attending a tailgate party prior to the FSU Football Homecoming game each year and through Facebook at Fairmont State Kappa Gamma Theta Xi Alumni Reunion Group. ## Class of 2017 Senior Campaign

On May 11, Fairmont State University students, faculty, staff, alumni and the community dedicated the new Falcon Commons, a brick pathway on the main campus that was selected as the Senior Campaign by the Class of 2017.

"As the Class of 2017, we hope that Falcon Commons and the engraved brick pathway will serve to symbolize the lasting impressions we have made on the University and the impact FSU has had on our lives," said James Jesmer, Student Body President and a member of the Class of 2017.

Student Government Association, in addition to the Fairmont State Foundation and the Class of 2017, worked to continue the Senior Class Gift tradition, encouraging seniors to leave a lasting mark on the campus that they love. The Class of 2017 selected as its project the creation of a brick pathway in the circular area on the east side of the Falcon Center, now known as the Falcon Commons. The project allows more use of that space as a pathway between the residence halls and the Falcon Center.

Students, alumni, friends and FSU employees purchased personalized bricks for the pathway and now have the opportunity to see them as part of the new pathway. The #putabrickonit campaign raised about \$12,000.



# **Freshman Counselor Reunion**






## **FSU Baseball Postseason Notebook**



Under second-year head coach Phil Caruso, the Fairmont State baseball team wrapped up a historic season on the diamond in 2017 setting a new single-season mark for wins in a year with 29.

The previous high for wins in a year was 25 back in 2006 when the Falcons ended the year with a 25-30 overall record. This years 29-win season is also just the 10th for the program since 1988. Caruso, the 2017 MEC Coach of the Year, has now led Fairmont State to a 50-53 record in two seasons at the helm of the program. FSU baseball totaled just 23 wins during the two season's prior to Caruso taking over.
